



The Stanislaus Area Crime Stoppers has a board of 13 members who volunteer their time and resources to the organization. Our local Crime Stoppers program began in June of 2005 by Modesto Police Chief Roy Wasden. He appointed a Coordinator to run the program along with 9 volunteer board members. The program was donated \$500 for the reward fund, and at the time was called the Modesto Crime Stoppers program. It wasn't until June of 2017 when the organization was renamed to the Stanislaus Area Crime Stoppers to reflect all the jurisdictions that it serves.

When a young college student, Michael Carmen, was shot to death during a robbery at gas station in Albuquerque, New Mexico in July 1976, Detective Greg MacAleese had no idea who was responsible for the homicide. No witnesses came forward and it appeared the senseless and brutal shotgun slaying would remain a mystery.

MacAleese, who worked for a newspaper before joining the Albuquerque Police Department, knew something innovative would be necessary to encourage the public to get involved and help solve the case. He conceived the idea of producing a video reenactment of the crime, guaranteed anonymity for anyone who was willing to call him with information and put up a reward from his own pocket to encourage someone to provide a lead that would help identify those responsible for the murder of Carmen.

MacAleese's plan to identify those responsible for killing Carmen worked. Within a few hours after the recreation of the murder was broadcast on television, he received a phone call. The video image had triggered the memory of a person who heard a loud bang in the vicinity of the gas station and then saw a car driving off. The caller said the vehicle belonged to a resident in a nearby apartment complex.

Through investigation, MacAleese and a team of detectives arrested two men within 72 hours and charged them with the murder of Carmen and a string of armed robberies. MacAleese received other calls following the reenactment, including one that allowed police to solve the rape of a young woman.

Realizing that this type of program might be useful in fighting crime, MacAleese convinced the Albuquerque Police Department to allow a group of citizens to establish the first Crime Stoppers program. For his efforts, Detective MacAleese was named one of the people in the 1970's who changed the face of the United States and was also named the country's Police Officer of the Year.

In October, we hosted our 6th annual Stanislaus Area Crime Stoppers Golf Tournament. Held at the beautiful Del Rio County Club in Modesto, this event has proven to be a favorite of those who have a love for golf. A full day was planned for attendees, beginning with the famous ball drop by the Stanislaus County Sheriff's Air 101 helicopter, followed by 18-holes of golf, then concluding with a seated dinner. 


The Stanislaus Area Crime Stoppers board members are active within the community we serve. We participate in multiple community events and other local non-profit events year-round.

The largest annual event that we attend is National Night Out. Board members go out to multiple community events and block parties on National Night Out and mingle with citizens to spread awareness of what Crime Stoppers is and how we work with law enforcement to solve crimes that have happened in our communities.

This was the second year that our board members attended the District Attorney's Annual Candlelight Vigil, which is an event in December for families of victims who have been killed by an act of violent crime, such as homicide. This event always touches our hearts, as we get to meet with those directly effected by the loss of someone they loved, some who are still seeking justice.





Tipsters are encouraged to submit their tips about crimes that have been committed within our anonymous reporting system. There are multiple ways in which to submit a tip. All ways are anonymous.

In 2024, \$8,325 in cash rewards were paid to tipsters and 30 arrests were made from information received in tips. Crime Stoppers encourages anyone with any information about a crime that was committed to send us a tip. If it helps a case, you'll receive a cash reward.





STUDENTS SPEAKING OUT

Students Speaking Out provides students with a safe and anonymous system to give information about criminal activity, threats or weapons, without fear of retaliation. If you have information about a crime committed at your school, or about threats of a crime or possible shooting.

WHEN TO SUBMIT A TIP

- You overhear someone bragging about having committed a crime.
- You know someone who is driving a stolen car, is hiding from the police, or selling drugs.
- You hear anything about a potential school shooting.
- You know someone who wants to hurt themselves or others.

If you aren't sure that what you saw or heard is really a crime, call anyway. It may be a piece of a clue to a big crime.

If you are a student, parent, teacher or other school staff member, you can report with information about crimes in and around your school. No one will ask for your name, just for your information.

If a crime is solved, if a criminal is arrested, or if a weapon is confiscated because of a tip you gave, you are eligible for a reward.

Rewards range from \$100 to \$1,000. The Board meets monthly to decide the amount paid for each successful tip.
